Paula gave us an update on major projects, including Vogtle 3&4 and plans to retire some of our coal plants and invest in additional renewables. The day before the Annual Stockholders Meeting we also learned that Gulf Power and our Florida plants would be sold to NextEra for a handsome profit and relief to our balance sheet. ### **SUMMARY OF LAST MONTH'S MEETING:**

Retired Alabama Power Vice President Julia Segars opened the meeting\_with an informal update on "Life After Southern", speaking about her second career as an award-winning humor columnist and author of the book <u>Aunt Sister</u>. She began the columns under the pen name "Aunt Sister" so as not to interfere with her corporate career. Julia's husband Frank Segars, an SCS retiree, appears frequently in her columns and in the book as Aunt Sister's husband "Fred", along with other family members and an odd assortment of Southern folks, "bless their hearts". 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The Executive Update was given by **E&CS Vice President Paula Marino**. Consumer demand is changing, and Southern Company is changing as well, Paula noted that the relationship between economic growth and electricity sales seems to be changing. Despite economic growth, commercial electricity sales remain weak. Energy efficiency and e-commerce may be causing a fundamental shift in the commercial class.

To combat this, Southern is working to find new revenue sources. We are focusing on technology development for the production, delivery and end-use of energy with projects such as APCs Smart Neighborhood to demonstrate distributed energy resource (DER) use case optimizing cost, reliability, and environmental impact with a community-scale microgrid. The Reynolds Landing neighborhood demonstrates building-to-grid integration with real time utility to customer interaction.

Indoor agriculture is another promising area. Indoor agriculture saves water, reduces pesticides, makes use of vacant buildings, and provides access to fresh foods.

Collaboration with governments, utilities, universities, and technology developers such as EPRI and DOE is key for projects such as National Carbon Collection Center and the Next-Gen Nuclear. Electric vehicle use is increasing.

Defensive measures to cut costs include closing business offices, restructuring, optimizing workforce, retiring facilities, increasing efficiencies, outsourcing labor and standardizing work products. Offensive measures include increasing bill pay options, expanding renewable portfolios, deploying distributed generation, adding service offerings and exploring new revenue streams.




### JULY MEETING DETAILS:

### **Executive Update:** <u>Leveraging Technology to Reduce</u> <u>Risk and Improve Reliability (Nuclear Industry</u> <u>Digitalization Initiatives</u>):



### **Executive Update (Cont'd)**

Our featured speaker is Brad Adams, Southern Nuclear Operating Company's Vice President of Engineering and recognized industry leader.

A review of technical news indicates that new tools and the "Industrial internet" enable the processing of large data streams-- including temperature and vibration indicators-- to produce real-time analyses, or "insights," that can be used to manage and potentially reduce costs of operations while adding value to services, for example, collecting real-time data, associated to how well a turbine is running, then running analytics on it so that to forecast in the future the high probability of when that turbine or equipment is going to fail. Operators are provided the analysis to make better decisions. Data analytics and predictive maintenance are key to reducing nuclear operating costs. Nuclear Energy Institute (NEI) launched the Delivering the Nuclear Promise (DNP) Strategic Plan, calling on operators to reduce generating costs by 30%.

As nuclear operators apply the latest digital technology to generation assets, they need to apply cost-effective cyber defense strategies. The United States Computer Emergency Readiness Team (US-CERT) has warned of an advanced persistent threat activity targeting energy sectors including nuclear power. The alert followed investigations by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

EPRI notes that cyber security concerns can prevent operators introducing new technology such as sensors and Instrumentation and Control (I&C) systems, into their plants. EPRI has pilots for risk-informed process at Arizona's Palo Verde and Duke's Oconee nuclear station. The current regulatory assumptions create a significant barrier to implementing DI&C and are inconsistent with operators experience and independent research conducted by EPRI.

Mr. Adams joined SNC in 2011 after twenty-eight years with Exelon Corp. in Illinois. He began his nuclear career as a design engineer for Commonwealth Edison's nuclear fuel services group and progressed to design group leader. Brad transferred to Byron Station and held managerial positions in regulatory assurance, system engineering and work management before being named Byron's site engineering director. Adams transferred to Quad Cities Nuclear Station as the site engineering director. He returned to Byron Station in 2008 as plant manager, a position he held until joining Southern Nuclear in 2011 as Fleet Operations Support Vice President. In December 2013 Adams assumed his current position as the SNC fleet Engineering Vice President.

Brad was co-chair of an industry working group comprised of nuclear experts who in April of 2016 submitted the report, Research Development and Demonstration (RD&D) Needs for Light Water Reactor (LWR) Technologies, to the Reactor Technology Subcommittee of the Nuclear Energy Advisory Committee, Office of Nuclear Energy, U.S. Department of Energy. He is the current chairman of the University of Tennessee Nuclear Engineering Board of Advisors; he is also executive sponsor of the EPRI Materials Reliability Program (MRP) and a member of their Pressurized Water Reactor Owner's Group.

Brad is a graduate of the University of Illinois where he earned Bachelors and Masters Degrees in Nuclear Engineering. He received his NRC Senior Reactor Operator (SRO) certification in 1999. He and his wife have two sons.

- The back of the Declaration of Independence says, "Original Declaration of Independence dated 4<sup>th</sup> July 1776."
- 10. The Pennsylvania Evening Post was the first newspaper to print the Declaration on July 6, 1776.
