

Can't believe the football season is already upon us!! To kick things off here are a few bits of trivia you may find interesting.

- Football was essentially rugby until 1882, when new rules were established that gave each team three tries to advance the ball five vards.
- That's also why the field looks like a gridiron.
   Lines had to be established so teams knew how far they had to go.
- Kickers got more respect in those early days.
   Originally, touchdowns were only worth four points, while field goals were worth five.
- In football's early days, the forward pass was illegal, so most plays were variations on a theme of "ball carrier smashes into the line of scrimmage." Unsurprisingly, this limited playbook led to a lot of injuries.
- As president, Teddy Roosevelt threatened to ban football unless new rules were established to ensure player safety. The revised rules introduced the forward pass.
- The new rules also cut the time of the games by ten minutes. Games were originally 70 minutes long.
- The huddle was first used in the 1890s by quarterback Paul Hubbard, who was deaf. Hubbard was concerned the other team could interpret his hand signals, so he brought his teammates into a round formation to call plays.

- The first professional football player was William "Pudge" Heffelfinger. He was paid \$500 to play in a game in 1892.
- The first televised professional football game took place in 1939. It wasn't quite the huge spectacle that pro football has become—that first broadcast only appeared on approximately 500 TV sets.
- If you're talking to a mathematician, the shape of a football is best described as a "prolate spheroid." But everyone will know what you're talking about if you just say "football-shaped."
- Fans who pay attention to the ball itself will notice a subtle difference between the pro and college balls. While both levels use identically sized balls, college games are played with balls that have white stripes painted on either end. These markings supposedly make a passed ball easier to spot while it's in flight.
- The longest field goal made in pro football history was 64 yards. The longest attempted field goal in pro football history was 76 yards. It missed.
- The name "football" was originally fitting since the game was largely played with players' feet. The first college game took place in 1869, but modern fans likely wouldn't have recognized the action. Each team had 25 men, and players weren't allowed to pick the ball up. Instead, they advanced towards the goal by kicking it or swiping at it with their hands.
- When future president Herbert Hoover attended Stanford in the early 1890s, he was a student manager of the football team.
   According to team lore, when Stanford and Cal met on the field for the first time in 1892, there was a delay after Hoover forgot to bring the ball.
- Modern games don't have this problem: Pro rules dictate that the home team has to have 36 balls (for outdoor games) or 24 balls (for indoor games) ready for inspection by the referee two hours before a game's starting time.

September Fun Facts

- The name of the ninth month of the year September – comes from the old Roman word "septem", meaning "seven", because in the Roman calendar it was the seventh month.
- The Romans believed that the month of September was looked after by the god of the fire and forge – Vulcan. Therefore, they expected fires, earthquakes and volcanic eruptions in this month.
- The zodiac signs for September are Virgo (August 23 – September 22) and Libra (September 23 – October 22).
- The birthstone for September is the sapphire, which is said to reduce inflammation, treat fever and act as a lucky charm for the person wearing it. The sapphire, present in almost every color (rich blue, pink, yellow, green etc.), symbolizes intuition, clarity of thought, peacefulness, as well as loyalty and trust.
- There are three traditional flowers of the month of September: the aster, symbolizing love; the forget-me-not, representing memories and love; and the morning glory, symbolizing unrequited love.
- Special holidays in September include Labor Day (the first Monday in September), the September equinox (September 22nd), National Grandparents' Day (celebrated in the U.S. on the first Sunday after the first Monday of September).



October Fun Facts

- The name of the month of October comes from the Latin "octo", meaning "eight", because in the Roman calendar October was the eight month of the year. With the adding of January and February after the Julian calendar reform, October became the tenth month of the year, as we know it today.
- The Anglo-Saxons called October "Wintirfyllith", meaning "fullness of winter".
- The holiday of Halloween comes from "All Hallows' Eve" or the night before "All Hallows" day ("All Saints" day) In old English "hallow" means "to sanctify".
- The zodiac signs for October are Libra (September 23 – October 22) and Scorpio (October 23 – November 21).
- The birthstones for October are the tourmaline and the opal. Tourmalines display a wide spectrum of colors (yellow, pink, blue, red, green, black or brown). They are believed to help you stay calm under pressure, bring peace and tranquility and defeat emotions like anger and jealousy. Opals exhibit different colors (green, white, yellow, blue, pink) depending on the conditions under which they were created. Opal gemstones are believed to cure eye infections, strengthen memory, calm nerves and enhance creativity.
- The traditional flower of the month of October is the calendula, symbolizing comfort, healing, protection and grace.
- Special holidays in October include Halloween (10/31), Columbus Day (second Monday of October), Yom Kippur, Diwali, and International Peace Day (October 2nd).
