As I entered the park area children were running up to me smiling, hugging, asking all the questions they ask Santa, and eager to tell me what they would like for Christmas. I found my way to my chair under the big oaks and sat there taking request for about 4 hours. I was hooked, this is a perfect thing for me to do. As I entered into 2014, I started researching more details about portraying Santa Claus. In March of that year I attended a convention in Gatlinburg with about 800 other Santa's. Training was very good and included tips for grooming, photo taking, insurance needs, how to set up an LLC, advertising, and how to manage your events.

With all this newly gained knowledge I set up my LLC, website, Facebook Page, secured my liability insurance, and purchased background check information to supply to my potential clients. In 2015, I attended a School for Santa's and was awarded a Masters Degree in Clausology. My Christmas Season in 2014 blossomed and I soon had many events on my calendar. Luckily, about 70 percent of my clients now are return clients that I see every year. In 2018, I had over 55 events and traveled over 4000 miles along the Gulf Coast area from Panama City to Foley, AL from mid-November until December 24.

Now, I mostly focus on home visits, corporate events, and community events. In 2017, I was one of the Santa's at the Bass Pro Shop in Spanish Fort, AL. It was a great experience working about 6 hours a shift 30 days in a row. I have also filled in at Cordova Mall in Pensacola as well in the past. Also, several parades, commercials, and magazine articles are in my portfolio. My first event on the calendar for this upcoming Season is November 15. I have about 30 events on the calendar and looking forward to a lot of fun.

I mention the fun. It a is a lot of fun talking with all the children about what they would like for Christmas. Sometimes it does turn to a more somber moment. The young lady, probably in the early 20's, from another country that had never taken a photo with Santa. She was so excited and cried and cried. The children who are sick themselves with that "C" word or ones that ask me to heal a family member or friend who has Cancer. I may cross the line a bit; but I always say I will pray for them. Then there is the child who ask me to make their mom and dad happy. I tell you this only to share that children trust Santa Claus. My answers to all those types of questions are uplifting and as always never promise but provide hope. I have posed with an 8 x 10 photo of a little boy several times. The family comes to one of my events each year so that he can see Santa. Yes, the little boy drowned late summer a few years ago.

While on this topic I have spent some time at Sacred Heart Children's Hospital here in Pensacola. I have had the honor of being their Santa attending their annual tree lighting a few times and riding an ambulance or helicopter into the event with a Miracle Child that has had miraculous results in their recovery. So many children face things unimaginable even to most adults.

By now, you may have noticed a passion for what I do and the good that it does for others, not to mention myself. As a child I remember my Maternal Grandfather's brother coming by our Christmas Eve event at my Grandparent's home and portraying Santa. I remember the excitement that my sister, cousins, and I had when Santa came to Granny and Grandpa's home. I just want to continue to spread that joy and excitement. Santa Claus, that is my chosen life after Southern Company. With my longer hair and real white beard, I am pretty much portraying my profession 365 days a year.
