## \*\*\*\*\*\*\*Notice of Change\*\*\*\*\*\* Southern Company Educational Gift Matching

One of the ways Southern Company Foundation supports employee giving is through its Educational Matching Gifts Program. The Foundation provides dollar-for-dollar matching gifts up to \$5,000 total for contributions employees and retirees make to eligible institutions of their choice.

In the past, this was handled by a program called EasyMatch. The new program is called CyberGrants. Accessing the new system is easy. You will need your six-digit Southern Company Employee ID to register on the new system. The link to CyberGrants is:

There are two links for access – one for active employees and one for retirees. Click on the second link to GET STARTED. As a first-time user, click on Create Your Password. You will be taken to the Registration Information screen.

After you have successfully registered, you are ready to make a contribution. You can either 'Request a Match' for a contribution you have already made, or you can 'Donate Via Credit Card' online. If you donate by credit card, the charge will show up as CyberGrants on your credit card statement. CyberGrants will pass the donation on to Southern Company Foundation, where it will be matched, and both your gift and the match will be passed on to the designated institution. This is only done quarterly.

If you choose to 'Request a Match,' such as for a gift you have made by check directly to the Institution, you will be taken to a form to enter the relevant information. The Foundation will forward the form to the Institution for confirmation of the gift. When the Foundation receives confirmation, a matching gift will be sent.

There is a tab at the top of the page where you can check your giving history and track your current gift. There is also a tab labeled Guidelines where you can read the Matching Gift rules and get help, if needed.

During our luncheon (which was ABSOLUTELY delicious) we were entertained by Frank Jones. Frank, a graduate of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, has served churches in Alabama and Texas.

He has served as pianist for the Alabama Singing Men since 1983 and has led worship and played piano for numerous events and church retreats, including standing pianist for the denomination state convention.

Additionally, checks were presented to the three organizations selected as our 2021 Charitable Contributions recipients. Those selected were (1) BraveJoy Ministries, (2) Seed, Time & Harvest Birmingham Restoration Ministries, and (3) a Team Ministries. Below is a brief description of the powerful ways these organizations impact our communities.

BraveJoy Ministries (LoveLife) exists to counsel, encourage, and support in every way the many moms and dads who face an unplanned pregnancy so that they actually can choose life for their baby, and have the means to do it. But for those who are post-abortive, we also offer specialized abortion trauma counseling and recovery Bible studies. More than 80% of women who choose abortion do so because they believe they have no support. We are working to provide the support they need through the pregnancy and beyond so that they and their children can have a full and enriched life.

We are uniting evangelical churches to pray for and minister to moms and dads at the abortion clinic (West Alabama Women's Center in Tuscaloosa and Planned Parenthood in downtown Birmingham) and partner with pregnancy care centers to help provide medical, legal, financial, housing, and discipleship care.

Seed, Time & Harvest Birmingham
Restoration Ministries is organized to restore
the lives of people afflicted with addictions to
drugs and alcohol, prostitution, gangs, and

residential therapy and faith-based curriculum
which includes Pastoral counseling, daily bible
studies, meaningful volunteer work within the
Ministry and life skills training. Rescued
individuals can expect free room and board and
in return we encourage a commitment to a new
life in Jesus Christ by hands on discipleship.





a Team Ministries is an organization committed to offering spiritual, emotional, and financial support to children and their families within the pediatric cancer community. They were created to fill the gaps between hospital and home care for pediatric cancer patients. Their goal is to help ease some of the financial and emotional burden by providing a homeaway-from-home, in close proximity to the hospital, when extended lodging away from home is required. During the holiday season, families are adopted, and sponsors provide Christmas gifts. This ministry also provides emotional support, prayer, and spiritual uplift for these families.

#### **HOLIDAYS TO REMEMBER IN JANUARY**



JANUARY 1

New Year's is approaching, a time when millions of people will celebrate with food, new resolutions or even kiss as the clock strikes midnight. But how much do you know about the holiday? Here are ten fun facts about New Year's.

- The first New Year's celebration dates back 4,000 years. Julius Caesar, the emperor of Rome, was the first to declare January 1 a national holiday. He named the month after Janus, the Roman god of doors and gates. Janus had two faces, one looking forward and one looking back. Caesar felt that a month named after this god would be fitting.
- Forty-five percent of Americans make New Year's resolutions. The top resolutions are: to lose weight, get organized, to spend less and save more, to stay fit and healthy, and to quit smoking. While nearly half of all Americans make resolutions, 25 percent of them give up on their resolutions by the second week of January.
- Be sure to eat leafy greens on New Year's. Tradition says that the more leafy greens a person eats, the more prosperity he or she will experience (what an incentive for staying healthy!). Tradition also says that legumes bring prosperity because beans and peas look like coins. No wonder why so many people eat black eyed peas on January 1.
- Many people ring in New Year's by popping open a bottle of champagne. Americans drink close to 360 million glasses of sparkling wine during this time. The bubbly stuff dates back to the 17th century when the cork was invented.
- About one million people gather in New York City's Times Square to watch the ball drop. The Times Square New Year's Eve ball drop came about because of a ban on fireworks. The first ball in 1907 was seven hundred pounds and was lit with 100 25-watt lights. The current ball puts the old one to shame (thanks to technology). Today, it is covered in 2,688 crystals, is lit by 32,000 LED lights, weighs 11,875 pounds and is twelve feet in diameter.
- Remember the last scene in When Harry Met Sally, when Harry references a song after he and Sally kiss? It was Auld Lang Syne, a song traditionally sung at the end of New Year's parties. Poet Robert Burns wrote it in 1788. Though most people do not know the words to Auld Lang Syne, the overall message is that people have to remember their loved ones, dead or alive, and keep them close in their hearts.
- If Santa is the most common symbol associated with Christmas, then Baby New Year is the symbol most commonly associated with....you guessed it, New Year's! Baby New Year is often seen in a diaper, black top hat, and a sash showing the numbers of the new year. Myth states that he matures into an old man during the year.
- Make sure to be surrounded by family or loved ones on New Year's Eve. The first person you come across in the new year could set the tone for the next 12 months. This applies to couples, as well. If a couple celebrating New Year's together does not kiss, the future of the relationship might be splitsville, so be sure to lay one on your significant other.
- At the Mummers Parade in Philadelphia, 10,000 participants step through City Hall and perform in unique costumes. The parade dates back to mid-17th-century, incorporating elements from Irish, German, English, Swedish and other European heritages. The parade itself is divided into five divisions: a comic division, wench brigades, fancy division, string bands, and fancy bridges. If you are in the area for New Year's, be sure to check out this event.
- According to statistics from the National Insurance Crime Bureau, vehicles are stolen on New Year's Day more than any other holiday. Don't think your old car is safe, either. In 2011, the 1994 Honda Accord was the most stolen car. To discourage car theft, make sure your car is in a populated area and always take your keys.

Martin Luther King Jr. (born Michael King Jr.; January 15, 1929 – April 4, 1968) was an American Baptist minister and activist who became the most visible spokesman and leader in the American civil rights movement from 1955 until his assassination in 1968. King advanced civil rights through nonviolence and civil disobedience, inspired by his Christian beliefs and the nonviolent activism of Mahatma Gandhi. He was the son of early civil rights activist and minister Martin Luther King Sr.

#### **HOLIDAYS TO REMEMBER IN FEBRUARY**

## GROUNDHOG DAY

February 2nd

On February 2, 1887, Groundhog Day, featuring a rodent meteorologist, is celebrated for the first time at Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania. According to tradition, if a groundhog comes out of its hole on this day and sees its shadow, it gets scared and runs back into its burrow, predicting six more weeks of winter weather; no shadow means an early spring.

Groundhog Day has its roots in the ancient Christian tradition of Candlemas, when clergy would bless and distribute candles needed for winter. The candles represented how long and cold the winter would be. Germans expanded on this concept by selecting an animal—the hedgehog—as a means of predicting weather. Once they came to America, German settlers in Pennsylvania continued the tradition, although they switched from hedgehogs to groundhogs, which were plentiful in the Keystone State.





FEBRUARY 13

Though the NFL officially formed in 1920, **the Super Bowl** wasn't played until more than 40 years later. In 1960, a group of businessmen who wanted to own football franchises—but were denied by the NFL—launched an alternative league, known as the American Football League (AFL).

For several years, the NFL and AFL were rivals, competing for fans, players, and support. Then, in 1966, owners negotiated an agreement to merge the leagues by 1970.

The first Super Bowl, which featured the AFL (Kansas City Chiefs) and NFL champions (Green Bay Packers), was played January 15, 1967. The game was originally called the "AFL-NFL World Championship Game." Later, Chiefs owner Lamar Hunt proposed using the term "Super Bowl" to refer to the championship game.





FEBRUARY 14

**Valentine's Day,** also called Saint Valentine's Day or the Feast of Saint Valentine, is celebrated annually on February 14. It originated as a Western Christian feast day honoring one or two early Christian martyrs named Saint Valentine and is recognized as a significant cultural, religious, and commercial celebration of romance and love in many regions of the world.



FEBRUARY 27

Presidents' Day is a federal holiday celebrated on the third Monday in February; Presidents' Day 2022 will occur on Monday, February 21. Originally established in 1885 in recognition of President George Washington, the holiday became popularly known as Presidents' Day after it was moved as part of 1971's Uniform Monday Holiday Act, an attempt to create more three-day weekends for the nation's workers. While several states still have individual holidays honoring the birthdays of Washington, Abraham Lincoln and other figures, Presidents' Day is now popularly viewed as a day to celebrate all U.S. presidents, past and present.





### RETIREE CORNER



With our Nation, having just paid honor on the 80th Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day, I thought everyone may like to hear about one of our own retirees that was a Pearl Harbor survivor - Ralph Tribble, Jr. Mr. Tribble retired in the first early out group in 1986.

After serving in the Air Force during the entire WWII and then in the Korean War, Ralph later hired on at SCS and moved in close to my house. Becoming carpool buddies and having served in Korea myself, we had a lot to discuss. He told me he was at the Air Base in Pearl Harbor when the Japanese attacked. Below is his personal story.

"Me and five buddies were eating breakfast when we heard many planes overhead, then the bombing started, and air raid sirens began. Quickly scrambling from the Mess, we ran for our stations. Approaching a small concrete building, three of us ran around it to the left side with the other three going around the right side. At this moment, a bomb exploded nearby to our right killing the three on that side; we on the left were saved, protected by the building. By providence, we three are alive today."

Ralph passed in August 2014 at age of ninety-five and is buried in Jefferson Memorial Gardens in Trussville. He comes to mind every December 7<sup>th</sup>.




**Retiree Corner (Cont'd)**


