Service Dogs of Alabama (SDA) is dedicated to providing medical and psychiatric assistant dogs to children, adults and veterans with disabilities. SDA places dogs for diabetic and seizure alert, autism, Post-traumatic Stress Disorder and stability and wheelchair assistance.

SDA trains facility dogs for school interventions involving counseling and learning disabilities. SDA also trains dogs who can assist children when they are testifying in court.

## **Keynote:**



As executive vice president of Southern Company's Technical and Project Solutions (T&PS), Paula Marino leads a workforce of approximately 1,700 individuals across the areas of new generation and environmental strategy development, major project design and construction execution, technology due diligence, power delivery engineering and O&M support.

Marino began her Southern Company career in 1993 and progressed through various roles in distribution, transmission, fossil-hydro generation and nuclear generation. She served as the assistant to the president of Southern Company Generation and managed multiple departments within Engineering and Construction Services (E&CS), including environmental and retrofit projects supporting Alabama Power. Marino also served as vice president of engineering at Southern Nuclear.


Marino earned a bachelor's degree and a master's degree in electrical engineering from Auburn University and is a licensed professional engineer in the states of Alabama, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kansas, Maryland, Mississippi, Nevada, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Texas, Virginia and Washington.

Marino cultivates advancements in engineering through several entities, serving on Auburn University's alumni engineering council and electrical engineering industrial advisory board as well as the University of Alabama at Birmingham's (UAB) civil, construction and environmental engineering advisory board; and participating as a founding member of Auburn's 100 Women Strong. Marino served as a member of the Center for Energy Workforce Development board of directors. Her contributions have been recognized throughout the industry. In addition to being named "Outstanding Alumna from the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering" in the Samuel Ginn College of Engineering at Auburn University, Marino is also the recipient of the Engineering Council of Birmingham (ECOB) 2012 Engineer of the Year and the 2015 Engineering Leadership Award. In 2017, Marino was inducted into the State of Alabama Engineering Hall of Fame and named a Woman of Distinction by the Girl Scouts of North-Central Alabama. Aside from her passion for the engineering industry, Marino enjoys spending time with her family and playing an active role in her church and community.

## DATES TO REMEMBER IN MAY







Many of us celebrate the Fourth of July every year with fireworks, barbecues, concerts and parades. Growing up, you may have heard that we celebrate Independence Day on July 4 because that's the day the Founding Fathers signed the Declaration of Independence, but that's not technically true! Although the Declaration was adopted on July 4, 1776, it wasn't signed by most people until a month later.

On July 2, 1776, the Continental Congress voted in favor of declaring independence from Great Britain. The Declaration of Independence was officially adopted two days later, marked by the ringing of the Liberty Bell at Independence Hall in Philadelphia.

At the time, John Adams believed that July 2, not July 4, would be the date remembered by history. "The Second Day of July 1776, will be the most memorable Epocha, in the History of America," Adams wrote in a letter to his wife on July 3 of that year. "I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival."

Early July 4 traditions have not carried through to the present day. Some colonists celebrated the day by holding mock funerals for England's King George III, as a way of reinforcing America's victory over the British monarchy, according to History.com.

The Fourth of July was celebrated annually throughout the 18th and 19th centuries, and in 1870, Congress declared the day a federal holiday. But it wasn't until 1941 that the date became a paid federal holiday for federal employees.

Today, fireworks displays around the country echo Adams' call for "bonfires and illuminations from one end of this Continent to the other."


